THE EUCHARIST: JESUS' CRAZY LOVE

Each saint had a real and personal relationship with Jesus, and some of them left writings that offer incredible insight into what that relationship looked like. St. Catherine of Siena's relationship with Jesus might take the cake, though: she described the Lord as *pazzo d'amore*, which is Italian for "crazy in love."

And if you really think about it, Jesus said and did some pretty crazy things.

That God would become a tiny baby, born in a stable? Kind of crazy. That He would work miracles for and offer mercy to people who didn't deserve it? Crazy. His passion, death, and resurrection to save each of us, who have sinned against Him? CRAZY. And perhaps the craziest thing of all is the Eucharist: that the God of the universe comes to us in what looks like bread, but is actually His real, full, living self. He comes so that He can live and work inside of us, so that His heart can be right next to ours. We need the crazy love of Jesus, and the world needs it, too. And just like St. Catherine of Siena, He wants each of us to be part of the way that everyone finds out about and experiences His crazy love.

This is the whole reason for the Eucharistic Revival and Eucharistic Pilgrimage:

that the crazy love of Jesus given to us through the Eucharist might be experienced and spread throughout the Church and the country and the world!

The best way for that to happen is for us to receive the Eucharist at Mass, to experience His crazy love just like the saints did, and to let it transform us from the inside out. Receiving Jesus in the Eucharist gives us power and strength to live differently, to love others differently, and to invite others to come and experience His love, too. And another way to bring Jesus' love to the world is for us to love Jesus in the Eucharist in a way that people can see, a way that probably doesn't make sense to them, a way that might even seem... crazy. To bring the Eucharist out of our churches and onto the streets, where we can gaze at Him with love, smile with joy because He loves us, pray together as a community, all so that the world might have a glimpse into the relationship we have with Him. A Eucharistic procession gives us a chance to do exactly that. St. Catherine of Siena knew the crazy love of Jesus because she experienced it. That same crazy love is offered to each of us as He comes to us in the Eucharist.

Whether it be during this year of Eucharistic revival or 100 years from now, through our personal reception of the Eucharist at Mass and our participation in holy hours and Eucharistic processions, let's let Jesus love us. Let's respond to His invitation to love Him back. And let's bring that love that He has for each of us, and that we have for Him, out onto the streets and sidewalks and everywhere else, that the whole world might know: the God who made you is *crazy* in love with you.

What you'll see during a Eucharistic Procession

Monstrance: the beautiful and usually fancy "container" for the Eucharist. It's beautiful and fancy because Jesus is God and He deserves something beautiful and fancy! But notice that the Eucharist is actually sitting in a part of the monstrance that isn't covered by gold or silver, it's just covered with glass, like a window: He wants us to see Him. As He always sees us.

Canopy: this is usually carried by 4 people, one on each corner, and covers the priest or deacon who is holding Jesus in the monstrance. It provides shade and cover for the priest or deacon, of course, but it also is a reminder that something, someONE very special is here: Jesus Himself.

Incense: as Catholics, we use incense a lot, and that's because it's a physical reminder that, just like the smoke from the incense, our prayers are sweet as they rise to Jesus! He loves when we pray to Him! The incense reminds us that we are asking Jesus to make us holy; to allow His crazy love to come into our hearts and to change us from the inside, more and more, so that we become more and more like Him.

Pauses: A Eucharistic Procession usually has a few stops or pauses along the way, when Jesus in the monstrance is placed on an altar for a little bit. This gives everyone time to gather around the Eucharist and sing, pray, and receive a blessing together, which is harder to do when you're all spread out in a procession. But it also reminds us of one more reality of Jesus' crazy love: He doesn't just want to "pass by," He wants to dwell with us. He wants to stay. He is Emmanuel, God who is WITH US.

Joy: This part of the procession depends on YOU. Jesus' love changes us and brings joy, and joy is contagious! It's up to you and me to actually let that joy shine through us so that the world might see it and know that what we have is meant for them, too.

GAINING A PLENARY INDULGENCE

"A decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary and approved by Pope Francis indicates that the plenary indulgence¹ will be granted to the Christian faithful who participate in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage at any point between May 17 and July 16, 2024. It will also be granted to the elderly, infirm, and all those who cannot leave their homes for a serious reason and who participate in spirit with the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, uniting their prayers, pains, or inconveniences with Christ and the pilgrimage. This indulgence is granted under the usual conditions of sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. The faithful may also apply this indulgence through suffrage for the souls of the faithful departed in Purgatory." (USCCB, announcement of April 9, 2024, emphasis added)

¹"An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven ... an indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin." (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1471)

Recite one Our Father, one Hail Mary, and the Apostle's Creed. Then, on the Our Father beads of the rosary, say the following words:

Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ,

R/ in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

On the Hail Mary beads, say the following words:

For the sake of His sorrowful Passion,

R/ have mercy on us and on the whole world.

At the conclusion of the chaplet, say three times:

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Closing Prayer:

Eternal God, in Whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion — inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself.

MOTHER SETON

Elizabeth Ann Bayley was born in New York City on August 28, 1774, to a prominent Episcopal family, and lost her mother at the age of three. In 1794, at the age of 19, Elizabeth married William Magee Seton, a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. Soon after William died in 1803, Elizabeth discovered Catholicism. She was deeply moved by the true presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. She entered the Catholic Church in 1805. After a number of difficult years, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph's, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, planting the seeds of Catholic education in the United States.



Her legacy now includes religious congregations in the United States and Canada, whose members work on the unmet needs of people living in poverty all over the world.

Mother Seton, as she is often called, was canonized on Sunday, September 14, 1975. She was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "Saint." Her remains are entombed in the Basilica at the National Shrine in Emmitsburg. During the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage pilgrims will walk in Mother Seton's footsteps. Mother Seton School is a direct descendant of the original school founded in 1810. St. Joseph's Church dates to 1786 and was pastored by a friend of the early sisters, Reverend John Dubois, who was the founder of Mount St. Mary's College and Seminary. Mount St. Mary's has a rich legacy of education and is often called the "cradle of bishops", having 55 bishops among its alumni. St. Anthony's Parish would have been called the "mountain church" during Mother Seton's time and, while the original building no longer stands, it was a parish that Mother Seton and her sisters frequented. Lastly, the National Shrine Grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes, began as "St. Mary's Chapel on the Hill". Elizabeth Seton and her sisters lived near the grotto in a small log cabin for six weeks upon their arrival to Emmitsburg as their new home in the valley was prepared. These places are truly holy ground.



It was Holy Saturday, 1957, when four-year-old Ann O'Neill's parents rushed her to Saint Agnes Hospital in Baltimore. The diagnosis: acute lymphatic leukemia. Medical treatments were unsuccessful. Children in the hospital, nurses, and Sisters prayed for Mother Seton to intercede. Ann's mother drove her to Emmitsburg and prayed before Mother Seton's relics. Days later, the doctors were amazed. Blood tests showed no evidence of the cancer.



Two years after Ann's original diagnosis, in 1959, the Vatican announced that Ann's healing would

contribute directly towards Mother Seton's beatification and ultimately, the declaration of Elizabeth Ann Seton's sainthood.

MOTHER MARY LANGE

The Oblate Sisters of Providence

In 1829 in Baltimore, French Sulpician priest, Fr. James Joubert and Mother Mary Lange, with the support of Archbishop Whitfield, founded the first successful order of sisters specifically for women of African descent. While working with children in the St. Mary's Seminary Lower Chapel on Paca Street, Fr. Joubert discovered that they had difficulty learning their catechism due to their inability to read. He called on two Caribbean teachers, Elizabeth Lange and Marie Magdelene Balas, who had started a free school in their home and who were contemplating consecrated life. Joined by Rosine Boegue, they



moved into a house near the seminary where they operated their school and began their novitiate. After Theresa Duchemin joined their number, the four took vows in July 1829 and founded the Oblate Sisters of Providence. Elizabeth received the name Sister Mary and was elected the first Superior, becoming known as Mother Lange. The cause for her beatification was opened in 1991, and she was declared venerable on June 22, 2023.

St. Frances Academy

On June 13, 1828, thirty-five years before President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, Mother Mary Lange, then Elizabeth Clarisse Lange (c1794-1882), established a school to provide a "Christian education to colored children." The school was established with the mission to teach "children of color to read the Bible," an act that, though not illegal in Maryland, would have been very difficult during the era of American slavery.

The Oblate School for Colored Girls operated for about a year at 5 St. Mary's Court in Baltimore's Seton Hill neighborhood, near St. Mary's Seminary and College on Paca Street. After several moves and name changes, the school is now known as St. Frances Academy and located on East Chase Street.

Completed in 1871, the St. Frances Academy building has served as Motherhouse for the Oblates, a pay school, a free school, and an orphanage.

The Baltimore Basilica

During the 1832 cholera epidemic, four Oblate Sisters of Providence were called on to provide nursing care for the poor residents at the almshouse. Later that year when cholera struck the Archbishop's residence, the Oblates again answered the call. Forty-nine-year-old Sister Anthony, who had just professed her vows earlier that year, and one of the four who served at the almshouse, nursed the Archbishop back to health. She returned again to nurse the Archbishop's housekeeper who had also fallen sick. After having survived two previous encounters with cholera, she contracted the disease again and died at the Archbishop residence, which is adjacent to the Baltimore Basilica.

Mother Mary Lange School

Opened in 2021 on North Martin Luther King Jr Boulevard, Mother Mary Lange Catholic School brings the history of a visionary woman of deep faith who founded the Baltimore-based Oblate Sisters of Providence and Saint Frances Academy in East Baltimore, to light once more.




