Welcome to the Eucharistic Revival's Year of Mission and the beginning of the Jubilee Year of Hope 2025!

A pilgrimage is a spiritual journey meant to bring you closer to God. Your journey will take you through some difficult tasks and others will be quite simple; some can be done alone, some will require the cooperation of others; some will be fun, some will be prayerful, some will be a formation experience. We hope that all of them will help you in your understanding of the Eucharist and your relationship with Jesus as missionaries of hope!

As you participate in the various experiences recommended, you may want to consider taking a picture of yourself/your group to document your journey. There's no order in which you must proceed. Do them as you wish and as you feel inspired. You don't have to do them all but consider doing some of the ones that inspire you and even some that may challenge you. And if you have something you think is Eucharist related but is not included here, please add it to the spaces provided. We encourage you to share your experiences with others from your parish.

We pray for all who undertake this journey towards Christ!

In the Scriptures, we hear over and over how Jesus invited people one by one to follow him. He also invites us to follow him more deeply and, just like him, to "walk with one" person to a new or renewed experience of God's love.

Evangelization, or "bringing the Good News," typically happens in one-on-one moments that are not planned or scripted. This can happen at the grocery store, the bus stop, or a sporting event. As Pope Francis has noted, "Anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love does not need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love" (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 120).

You might be asking yourself: Where do I start with inviting someone to take a step closer to Jesus? How might I invite them forward in their faith? Here's a simple four-stage process of accompaniment that focuses on a "heart-to-heart" approach:

- 1. Identify someone in a spirit of humility
- 2. Intercede for that person in communion with the Holy Spirit
- 3. Connect in Eucharistic friendship
- 4. Invite that person on a path most suitable for him or her

Throughout each stage of your "Walk with One" journey, we encourage you to pray the Eucharistic Examen (found at the website below) to help you discern the path the Lord is calling you to follow. The bottom line is this: If you can open your heart to speak about how Jesus has touched your life, your heart will touch the heart of whomever the Holy Spirit leads you to accompany.

Encounter Christ in the Encharist - Encounter Hope!

Prepare Your Heart

("Year of Mission Playbook" p. 10)

- Commit to praying the Eucharistic Gospel Reflection Process each week (see p. 29).
- Be open to encountering Christ in Mass, in prayer, and in worship.
- Rediscover "the sense of adoration in silence."
- Open your heart and mind daily to Christ in his Word.
- Be open to encountering Christ in all people, especially in the least, the last, and the lost.
- Ask Jesus if the apostolic activity you are about to undertake—or
 have already begun—is truly what he calls you to do, being receptive
 to his voice, and embracing his call with a humble and joyful spirit.
- Embrace your relationship with Jesus as the foundation of your identity and mission

Celebrate Your Faith in Hope!

Provide opportunities for others to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist and invite them to come to our Lord.

- Invite someone to pray with you in Eucharistic adoration.
- Invite someone to attend a Holy Hour with you.
- Invite someone to pray with you and reflect on the Scriptures

Life in the Eucharist - Life of Hope

Prepare Your Heart

("Year of Mission Playbook" p. 21)

- Commit anew to the veneration of the Blessed Mother and the saints, especially those who exemplify Eucharistic living.
- Pursue ongoing formation in the faith, particularly in small group settings.
- Embrace the communal dimension of the Christian life by deeper engagement in your parish and other Catholic institutions.
- Become an ambassador of reconciliation and healing to others, extending the divine mercy that you have received.
- Unite personal sufferings to the suffering of Christ to participate in his ongoing plan of redemption for the world.
- Become a footwasher: Enter into Christ's act of self-oblation in the Eucharist, continuing his work in concrete practices of love for your neighbor.
- Accompany those on the margins and peripheries of life, including existential peripheries, taking the opportunity to show to each of these people the presence of a compassionate God who wants to express himself to them and to act through your deeds, words, and even just your presence.

Celebrate Your Faith in Hope:

- Invite someone to accompany you and reach out and minister to the sick and suffering within your community, helping strengthen the bonds of the Mystical Body of Christ with those in greatest need.
- Intercede for Others. Prayer of Intercession: "O Father, in Your mercy, hear Your children's pleas. As we prepare for the Jubilee of 2025, renew our faith, increase the virtues of hope and charity in us, and help us be witnesses of Your love in the world."

Encharistic Missionaries of Hope

Prepare Your Heart

("Year of Mission Playbook" p.27)

- Discern how to pastorally invite people into a relationship with Jesus and his Church.
- Pray for a spirit of zeal and boldness to evangelize by word and deed, becoming bread broken for others.
- Find ways daily to serve others as Christ served, washing the feet of those in need.
- Live a life of sacrifice by offering your joys and struggles on the altar.
- Deepen your formation and understanding of the role of the Holy Spirit in sending you out on mission.
- Commit to "Walk with One" person during this Year of Mission

Celebrate Your Faith in Hope!

- Identify and provide spiritual and material care to those in need.
- Form disciples through the Eucharist to go out with a love for Christ and an understanding of why we evangelize, teaching them how to approach others in a meaningful, effective, and loving way.
- Invite someone to attend a spiritual retreat or other formation opportunity to experience the renewing and transforming power of the Holy Spirit.
- Visit those who are homebound and pray together or become an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Community who visits the sick and lonely.
- Consider local missionary work through small groups and family experiences.

Jubilee Indulgence: Pious Visit to Sacred Places

Indulgences

The Jubilee Indulgence is a concrete manifestation of God's mercy, which goes beyond and transforms the boundaries of human justice. This treasury of grace entered human history in the witness of Jesus and the saints, and by living in communion with them our hope for our own forgiveness is strengthened and becomes a certainty. The Jubilee indulgence allows us to free our hearts from the weight of sin because the reparation due for our sins is given freely and abundantly. In practical terms, the experience of God's mercy involves some spiritual acts indicated by the Pope. Those who cannot make the Jubilee pilgrimage due to illness or other circumstances are nonetheless invited to take part in the spiritual movement that accompanies the Jubilee year, offering up the sufferings of their daily lives, and participating in the Eucharistic celebration.

The opening of the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican marks the beginning of the Jubilee. That of San Pietro is one of the six papal basilicas that enjoy the highest rank within the Roman Catholic Church. Four of these are located in Rome and are the largest, the other two considered minor are located in Assisi. The major basilicas have a papal altar and a holy door that is opened only for the duration of a Holy Year with a special rite by the Pope or by a person in charge of him. The role of the holy door is the granting of the plenary indulgence while the papal altar is used by the Pope or a few other priests to celebrate the Eucharist.
