### A Year of Umoja: Part 4

In the fourth installment of “A Year of Umoja,” Umoja (unity), is the first and foundational principle of the Nguzo Saba. Without it, all the other principles suffer.

Culture plays a vital role in shaping our identities, building connections, and fostering resilience. For the Black community, preserving and celebrating cultural heritage is essential for promoting pride, unity, and empowerment. Culture holds significant importance for the Black community in several ways:

- 1. Identity and Pride: Culture provides a sense of identity and pride, helping Black individuals understand and celebrate our unique history, heritage, and contributions to society.
- 2. Unity and Connection: Shared cultural experiences and traditions can foster unity and connection within the Black community, promoting social cohesion and collective strength.
- 3. Resilience and Empowerment: Cultural practices and narratives can serve as sources of inspiration, resilience, and empowerment, helping the Black community navigate and overcome systemic challenges.

Despite the importance of culture, the Black community often faces unique challenges that threaten cultural preservation and expression:

- 1. Cultural Appropriation: The appropriation of Black cultural practices and symbols by individuals and entities from outside the community can result in misrepresentation, exploitation, and loss of cultural ownership.
- 1. Systemic Racism: Systemic racism and discrimination can contribute to the devaluation of Black culture, perpetuating negative stereotypes and undermining the importance of cultural preservation.
- 2. Limited Resources and Representation: The Black community may face limited access to resources and platforms to support cultural preservation and expression, hindering the celebration and promotion of our rich heritage.

To address these challenges and promote the preservation and celebration of Black culture, it is essential to foster inclusive community discussions that prioritize the voices and experiences of the Black community. Here are three key reasons why community dialogues are crucial:

- 1. Honoring and Elevating Black Voices: Community discussions provide a platform for Black individuals to share their experiences, stories, and perspectives, ensuring that the richness of Black culture is recognized and celebrated.
- 2. Challenging Stereotypes and Misconceptions: Engaging in open and honest conversations can help to challenge and dismantle stereotypes and misconceptions about Black culture, fostering greater understanding and appreciation.
- 3. Collaborating on Cultural Initiatives: Community dialogues can facilitate collaboration on cultural initiatives, such as art exhibitions, cultural events, and educational programs that empower the Black community and elevate our cultural contributions.

Culture is a powerful force that shapes our identities, builds connections, and fosters resilience. By engaging in inclusive community discussions, we can honor and elevate the richness of Black culture, challenge stereotypes and misconceptions, and collaborate on initiatives that celebrate the unique heritage and contributions of the Black community. It is time to recognize the importance of culture and its impact on the Black community and to come together to ensure that the beauty and strength of Black culture are preserved, celebrated and cherished for generations to come.

## Take a Walk Today

You miss a lot by driving or riding in a car or bus. When you walk, you'll likely see more, a lot more. People, buildings, trees, flowers, garbage, dogs, houses and so much more -it's all out there to see. Walking does that, it makes it possible to see the world close-up.

For many years, "prayer walks" were popular in Baltimore City. Walks and marches for peace and justice are centuries old. Walking with meaning, intention, or purpose is part of the work for justice. Where and when have you walked with others?

Throughout the Civil Rights Movement, African American leaders utilized "walks for justice" as a powerful tactic to protest racial injustice, most notably exemplified by the Selma to Montgomery marches, where activists led by Martin Luther King Jr. walked to advocate for voting rights, facing violent opposition from authorities, ultimately drawing national attention to the issue and galvanizing support for the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Other significant "walks for justice" include James Meredith's solitary march through Mississippi, which later became the "March Against Fear" led by other civil rights leaders after Meredith was shot, and the March on Washington where a large group of protesters marched peacefully to the Lincoln Memorial to demand civil rights legislation.

Each year we walk with the St. Bernadine parish community to remember the importance of walking and following in the ways of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Msgr. Ed Miller.

The words of the spiritual, "I want Jesus to walk with me..." come to mind. So many have and are walking with the Lord in the direction of peace and justice and freedom. We have a long way to walk yet. So, keep walking. We're not there yet. Let's walk together.

## Jubilee 2025

### Pilgrims of Hope

The Vatican and the city of Rome are expecting an estimated 35 million people to flock to the Eternal City for the 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope - the first ordinary jubilee since the Great Jubilee of 2000. It is also the 2,025th anniversary of the Incarnation of Our Lord.

A jubilee is a special holy year of grace and pilgrimage in the Catholic Church. It typically takes place once every 25 years, though the pope can call for extraordinary jubilee years more often, such as in the case of the 2016 Year of Mercy or the 2013 Year of Faith.

The Jubilee year will offer the faithful opportunities to participate in various jubilee events at the Vatican and in dioceses around the world. The great tradition of opening the Holy Door will begin when Pope Francis opens the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024. Other holy doors will be opened at the Rome basilicas of St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major and St. Paul Outside the Walls. For pilgrims who cannot travel to Rome, bishops around the world are expected to designate their cathedrals or a popular Catholic shrine as special places of prayer for Holy Year pilgrims, offering opportunities for reconciliation, indulgences and other events intended to strengthen and revive faith. Father in heaven,

## **Bishop Fernand Joseph Cheri III, OFM January 28-1952- March 21, 2023**

Bishop Fernand Joseph “Ferd” Cheri III, OFM was a member of the Order of Friars Minor and served as an auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of New Orleans from 2015 until his death in 2023.

Born in New Orleans to Fernand Jr. and Gladys Cheri, he received his high school education at St. John Vianney Preparatory Seminary in New Orleans. He went on to study at St. Joseph Seminary College in Covington, Louisiana, and Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans.

Cheri was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of New Orleans by Archbishop Philip Hannan on May 20, 1978, after his ordination, Cheri received a Master of Theology degree from Xavier University of Louisiana Institute for Black Catholic Studies in New Orleans. After serving in parishes in New Orleans, he entered the novitiate of the Sacred Heart Province of the Order of Friars Minor (Franciscans) in 1992, professing solemn vows in the order in 1996. As a Franciscan he served as chaplain at Hales Franciscan High School in Chicago from 1994 to 1996. He served as pastor in Nashville, Tennessee, as member of the provincial council for the Franciscan Province of the Sacred Heart, St. Benedict the Black Friary in East St. Louis, Illinois, as well as campus ministry at Xavier University and Quincy University.

Bishop Cheri’s motto was “God is my strength.” He wrote articles and books on African American Catholic liturgy and served as an archivist of Black religious music.

It provides lifesaving assistance in emergencies and supports long-term development programs that help families and communities build resilience, reducing the need for humanitarian aid in the future.

By advocating today, your voice can help:

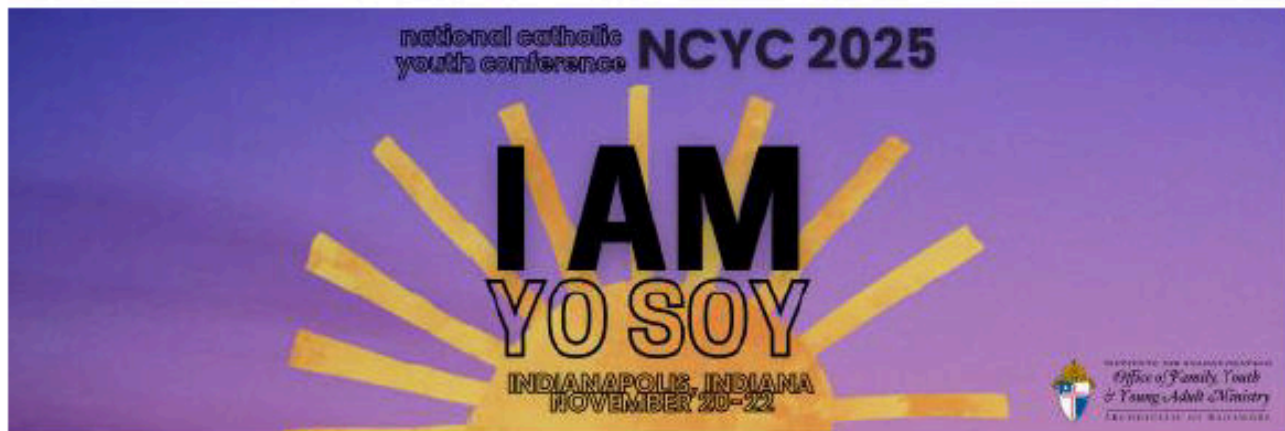

At the National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC), high school youth and their adult leaders have the opportunity to gather in the Eucharistic heart of the United States: Indianapolis, host city for the 2024 National Eucharistic Congress!

The National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC) is the premiere Catholic youth event on a national scale that gathers people from across America for a life-changing encounter with Christ. Thousands of young people and their adult leaders will gather for this powerfully unique three-day experience of prayer, community, evangelization, catechesis, service, and empowerment for Catholic high schoolers and their adult chaperones. At NCYC 2023, there were 12,071 attendees, 242 priests and deacons, 22 bishops, and 130 exhibitors.
